Class Updates

ETI was recently informed that the California State Certification Exam will be moving to digital codebooks only at testing sites. Paper codebooks will no longer be available during the exam.

Knowing this change was coming, ETI has been working with the NFPA to make sure our apprentices have access to the digital codebooks. While a permanent solution is still being worked out, ETI was able to negotiate temporary digital codebook subscriptions for the following groups:

- 5th Year Inside Wireman Apprentices
- 3rd Year Residential Wireman Apprentices
- 4th Year Transportation Systems Apprentices
- 3rd Year Sound & Communications Apprentices

If you're in one of these classifications, you should have received an email directly from the NFPA with instructions on how to activate your temporary digital subscription.

This is another step in making sure our apprentices are prepared before they arrive at the testing center. As the state moves to digital testing resources, it's important that everyone becomes comfortable navigating the digital codebook before exam day.

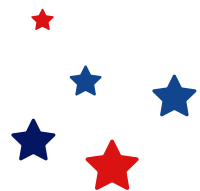
LAETI Shares 46 Innovations at NETDA Conference

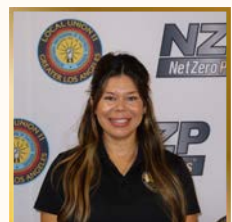
LA ETI GRADUATION

LA ETI'S CLASSROOM *technology* INITIATIVE

As part of ETI's ongoing commitment to enhancing the learning experience, we have been working to provide a dedicated laptop at almost every student workstation where classroom activities require computer access.

Over the past year, we have made significant progress and now have laptops available on nearly every desk across many of our classrooms. While we've come a long way, we're not finished yet. The IT Department continues to deploy additional permanent classroom laptops and expand technology resources throughout ETI's training facilities.

If you notice any issues with a classroom laptop such as physical damage, login problems, missing equipment, software issues, or anything that doesn't seem right—please notify your instructor as soon as possible. Instructors can then alert the IT Department so we can investigate and resolve the issue promptly.



Lenovo Laptop Tips

- The Lenovo V14 G4 ABP features a 180-degree hinge, allowing the screen to open completely flat. This makes it easier to share your screen with classmates, instructors, or study groups without everyone crowding around the laptop.
- The Lenovo includes a physical privacy shutter on the webcam. When you're not using Zoom, Teams, or other online learning tools, simply slide the shutter closed for added privacy.
- The Lenovo V14 G4 ABP includes Low Blue Light technology and an anti-glare display to help reduce eye fatigue during long study sessions.
- Student Tip: Follow the 20-20-20 Rule. Every 20 minutes, look at something 20 feet away for 20 seconds to give your eyes a break.
- The Lenovo V14 G4 ABP is designed to withstand everyday wear and tear, but it is not indestructible. Please help keep these laptops in good condition by handling them carefully, keeping food and drinks away, transporting them safely, and reporting any damage promptly.

Remember: "Military tested" does not mean "apprentice proof." A little care goes a long way toward keeping these systems available and reliable for everyone.

PORT WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT TOUR

This summer, we welcomed representatives from Congressman George Whitesides' office and Assembly member Juan Carrillo's office for a workforce development tour of the Port of Long Beach and Port of Los Angeles.

The tour offered a firsthand look at the skilled workforce that keeps our nation's supply chain moving. Participants learned about the vital roles of crane operators, electricians, ironworkers, and welders, while gaining insight into the growing demand for highly trained professionals across the building and construction trades.

A key focus of the tour was highlighting the educational and career pathways available through apprenticeship. Each summer, we bring students, workforce development cohorts, and building trades programs to the ports to introduce them to rewarding careers and connect them with real-world opportunities. Joining the tour were graduates of the West Valley Occupational Center MC3 program and students from the Electrical Program at Long Beach City College. Their participation underscored the value of collaboration between educational institutions, labor organizations, industry partners, and elected officials in preparing the next generation of skilled workers.

We appreciate the continued engagement and support from Congressman Whitesides' and Assembly member Carrillo's offices as we work together to expand apprenticeship opportunities, strengthen workforce development, and build a highly skilled workforce for the future.



GOOD JOBS FOR TRIBAL COMMUNITIES

I was honored to participate in the Good Jobs for Tribal Communities SoCal Leaders Summit, where Tribal leaders, Native community members, workforce partners, educators, and industry stakeholders came together to discuss expanding access to high-quality career pathways.

During the Working Lunch: Sector-Specific Action session, I shared an overview of the Electrical Training Institute and the electrical apprenticeship model, including how apprenticeships combine paid, on-the-job training with classroom instruction through an "earn while you learn" approach.

The discussion highlighted the growing career opportunities within the electrical industry, especially in areas such as clean energy, EV charging, energy efficiency, and building electrification. We also discussed common barriers applicants may face, including access to information, preparation resources, and early exposure to the trades.

This conversation reinforced the importance of strong partnerships between Tribal communities, workforce organizations, educators, and industry partners. By working together, we can expand access to apprenticeship opportunities and help prepare the next generation of skilled workers for family-sustaining careers.

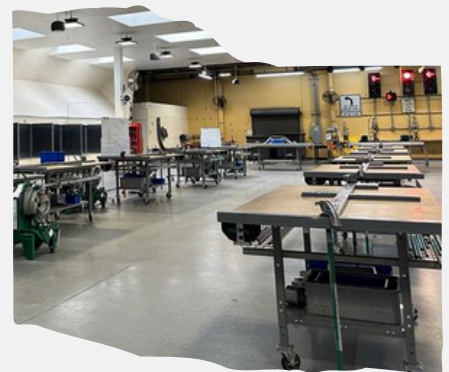
LRI LAB AND HIGH-BAY IMPROVEMENTS CONTINUE

FATIGUE IN CONSTRUCTION



Fatigue is a major safety concern in the construction industry. Long hours, physically demanding labor, extreme weather conditions, and tight project deadlines can all contribute to worker exhaustion. When construction workers are fatigued, their reaction times slow down, judgment becomes impaired, and the risk of accidents increases significantly.

Construction sites already contain many hazards, including heavy equipment, elevated work areas, power tools, and moving vehicles. A tired worker is more likely to make mistakes such as failing to follow safety procedures, misusing equipment, or overlooking potential dangers. Fatigue-related incidents can lead to serious injuries, falls, equipment damage, and even fatalities.

Several factors commonly cause fatigue in construction. Extended shifts, night work, insufficient sleep, dehydration, and repetitive physical tasks are among the most common contributors. Mental stress can also increase fatigue, especially when workers face production pressure or demanding schedules.

Employers can help reduce fatigue by promoting proper scheduling, allowing adequate rest breaks, and encouraging workers to report when they are too tired to safely perform their duties. Supervisors should monitor workers for signs of fatigue such as slowed movements, poor concentration, irritability, and frequent mistakes. Training employees to recognize fatigue hazards is also an important part of maintaining a safe work environment.

Workers can help manage fatigue by getting enough sleep, staying hydrated, eating healthy meals, and taking scheduled breaks. Avoiding alcohol and excessive caffeine before work can also improve alertness and overall performance.

Preventing fatigue is essential for maintaining productivity and protecting workers on construction sites. A strong safety culture that values rest and worker well-being can significantly reduce accidents and create a safer, more efficient workplace.

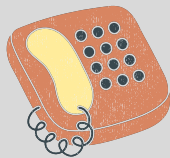
